
Fall 2019 NEWSLETTER

The returns of Chinook to the Skeena River in the summer of 2018 were at a satisfactory level for DFO to allow regular limits of two and four possession for Chinook this season.

The Nass River also had good returns which was great for us as most fish we get close to the lodge are these fish.

Once we make our way over to Dundas Island, that is where a large majority of the Skeena fish are intercepted.

The overall size and numbers of Chinook was up from the past couple years. We were fortunate enough to retain more tyee-sized Chinook this year than the last two years combined.






Beautiful morning for a troll as the fog rolls in and out.

There are steady limits of halibut that leave the lodge all summer long.

The size of the halibut this year was one fish up to 126 cm or two under 90 cm for your trip. This was a new limit that was implemented for this season, and we believe it worked out well for everyone. It gave people the opportunity to retain a fish up to approximately 60 pounds or two up to 20 pounds depending on how fishing was for your trip.

Regardless of the size of halibut that ended up being your catch within these size restrictions, it is all extremely tasty meat.


