
EPL EXPRESS NEWSLETTER 2021



Welcome Back



May was a somewhat cold month up in the Pacific Northwest, but the fish did not seem to mind. We only had a few trips this month due to travel restrictions, but once we started trolling the Briny Blue, the Chinook were not far off from biting the hooks. The early Chinook run continues to be strong up in our area which we all feel fortunate to be able to partake in. There are no Coho at this time of the season, so all attention is directed at the mighty Chinook and halibut. The average size range for Chinook is from 18 - 30 lbs with the possibility always present for something larger.

reduced to one fish a day and two in possession to take home. The changing limits for the Chinook through the remainder of the season are all in effort to help protect the Skeena River stock. Unfortunately, over the last few years, the number of fish that have been recorded entering the Skeena are always fluctuating but generally on a downward trend. Fisheries decided to implement these regulation changes and it is up to us to do our part and to strictly follow the regulations. These are a year-to-year decision based upon what the sport fishing community will be allowed to retain regarding salmon. The regulations are also placed in the river system itself with the hope that the fish can make it to their spawning grounds. In turn, the result is that there is a prosperous year and many of the offspring

The fishing was quite good, and most groups had good success with a Tyee or two being part of the group's effort. The weather really turned around and we experienced some beautiful sunny weather with calm seas. Halibut fishing is always welcomed when we are fortunate enough with flat waters. The reef, the inside waters and various other spots were all plentiful with halibut from the start of the season right until the end. The raised limit size on the halibut this year of 133cms allowed fish to be measured up to the mid 60lb range.

There was a non-retention on Chinook implemented. We turned our attention to Coho fishing at this point which gave everyone a chance at taking some salmon home. Luck was on our side and the Coho showed up right when they should have. Once the Coho enter our waters looking for food, they are generally quite aggressive and are willing to hit the lines. The number of Coho that were around was impressive and an improvement over the last couple of years. It is always great being able to report an increase in fish numbers over previous years, so hopefully this trend continues.

Once the Chinook opened again it was time to troll for them and Coho. Good times are always had when you do not know if it is a powerful Chinook biting or a high-flying Coho! Either way, smiles are always on the agenda. Mix in some bottom fishing for halibut and by the end of a trip, there is plenty of premium fish for everyone to enjoy.




